10:30 A.M. – 12:00 P.M.	<i>Constitutional Carry vs. Regulatory Law: Impacts on Private Security</i> Even before the U.S. Supreme Court’s monumental opinion in <i>New York State Rifle & Pistol Assoc., Inc. v. Bruen</i> , concealed weapon permits were no longer required in 23 states, including Alabama, and an estimated 21 other states were considering so-called “constitutional carry” laws or other loosening of restrictions on how and where firearms may be carried. How is this impacting armed security? Will this force a change in how the industry is regulated? Following an overview of the current state of the law, including <i>Bruen</i> , panelists representing regulatory enforcement, 2 nd Amendment advocates, and legal counsel from a security company licensed in many states will discuss the implications.

<p>1:30 P.M. – 2:30 P.M.</p>	<p><i>The Nose Knows: Advancing the Art and Science of Detection Dog Capabilities</i> Michael Larkin, Vice President Commercial Services Global K9 Protection Group</p> <p><i>Through presentation and demonstration, we will explore the art and science of detection dog capabilities and how to best deploy this mobile detection system in screening heavily populated areas. Active and dynamic environments on school campuses, public gathering venues and high-traffic pedestrian areas demand a specialized solution for mitigation and detection of firearms. How do we best support canine operations in direct contact against a variety of threat-delivery systems: body-worn, concealed-carried, vehicle-delivered or static explosive materials and firearms?</i></p> <p><i>Global K9 Protection Group (GK9PG) is the nation’s leader in K9 explosives and weapons detection capabilities focused on public safety. Michael Larkin, a 30-year veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps and retired Master Gunnery Sergeant, is Vice President of Commercial Services for Global K9 Protection Group, where he oversees a portfolio of professional sports and entertainment venues, transportation agencies, theme parks and law enforcement counterterrorism K9 units across the country. His efforts to advance Kinetic detection dog capabilities involves partnerships with Auburn University - Canine Performance Sciences and John Hopkins University - Applied Physical Sciences as the only private company supporting a longitudinal study focused on canine performance.</i></p>

Assuming that's successful, how long before we're digitizing occupational licenses, registrations and other credentials? Issuing digital ID cards, as opposed to printing and mailing "hard" cards, would be a huge time and cost savings for most agencies. Is there a downside? We'll welcome a panel from jurisdictions launching this option, as well as digital ID vendors leading the way. Let's hear what's driving the shift, discuss the details and witness some demonstrations first-hand.</i></p>

Traditionally, sheriff's offices have managed such transport, but increasingly this role is moving to private security companies. Is this nationwide trend another example of security guards assuming traditional law enforcement duties? Should this work be licensed?</i></p>
